The Cheetah!


What circus performers can see in the dark? The Acro-Bats!

Discussion Questions

PARENTS: Talking about disability with your children will give them understanding and teach them acceptance. Kids are naturally curious and are more similar than they are different. These questions are meant to be a guide to a conversation about disability.

Ben, the main character in the book, uses a wheelchair. Why do you think he needs a wheelchair?

Is he able to pretend and play like everyone else?

Can you think of some other types of disabilities?

What does it mean to be someone's friend?

If someone is in a wheelchair or has another type of disability, does that mean they can't play?

How can you be nice to someone and make someone feel included?

What are some ways that you are similar to someone with a disability?
